
## **MISSION**

## **OUR PROGRAMS**

Project: SAFE provides services to victims and survivors in 4 key areas.



### **DOMESTIC VIOLENCE**

Domestic violence is a pattern of behavior used to establish power and control over another person through fear and intimidation, often including the threat or use of violence. Domestic violence happens when one person believes they are entitled to maintain coercive control over their partner.



### SEXUAL ASSAULT

Sexual assault is legally defined as "any physical act of a sexual nature that is accomplished toward another person without their consent."



### STALKING

Stalking is a series of actions that make a person feel afraid or in danger. Stalking is serious, often violent, and can escalate over time. Stalking is unpredictable and dangerous. Stalking situations can widely vary.



### **DATING VIOLENCE**

Affects both adult and teens. Defined as any physical, sexually, or psychologically violent behavior, including stalking, directed towards a current or former dating partner. Includes similar power and control dynamics of domestic violence.

## **VOLUNTEERS & INTERNS**

In 2022, Project: SAFE had a total of **99** volunteers having served a total of **777** hours and **3** interns having served a total of **367** hours totaling **1,144** hours!

### **GRANTS**

With the assistance of the Community Grant Writer, Sara Dame, Project: SAFE was able to submit a total of 16 grants throughout the 2022 year. Although the agency was not awarded every grant, we were funded a total of \$1,151,816 in grant funds that span across 5 years.

### **Grants Received:**

ARPA DOC Non-Profit Relief - Domestic violence services. Awarded \$38,477.

ARPA FVPSA Tier 1 – Office and shelter cleaner, hotel/motel vouchers and mental health assistance. Awarded \$11,754.88.

ARPA FVPSA Tier 2 – Mental health professional partnership, hotel/motel vouchers, and legal/interpretation assistance services. Awarded \$43,600.

Avedis Foundation - Year 2 of Critical Services grant. Awarded \$68,735.

FVPSA COVID Mitigation - COVID relief and prevention. Awarded \$10,000.

FVPSA Sexual Assault - Two- and half-year grant for sexual assault services. Awarded \$111,250.

Junior Service League, Spring - University outreach for resident assistants. Awarded \$500.

Love-Meyer Foundation – General operating expenses. Awarded \$10,000.

Paul Milburn Foundation - Match for client assistance funds. Awarded \$12,500.

Pottawatomie County ARPA – Domestic violence services. Awarded \$100,000.

SSM Health - Mental Health Professional partnership. Awarded \$10,000.

Tribal Set-Aside – Five-year partnership with Iowa Tribe to provide services in Lincoln County. Awarded \$710,000.

United Way of Pottawatomie County – Sexual Assault Victims' Services, on-call services and resources.\$25,000.

## DATA COLLECTION

Project: SAFE collects data utilizing tools administered by VOCA, VAWA and OAG (FVPSA). The Performance Measurement Tool (PMT) from VOCA gathers quarterly data specific to victim types and total number of victims served. The data provides demographic information, victimization type, special classification of individuals and type of direct service. This snapshot data gives the agency a well-rounded picture of the clientele served, as well as areas where outreach can be improved.

The OAG/FVPSA quarterly reports target shelter data as well as demographic information of total clients served in the agency. The FVPSA report tracks specific numbers related to number of clients served in shelter, outreach events, types of services to adult clients, etc.

The Muskie report for VAWA is done every six months. The data represented in the Muskie is specific to programs funded by VAWA. For Project Safe, VAWA funds our sexual assault advocacy program. Our program assists victims of assault, both primary and secondary, and also includes advocacy for victims who undergo a Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) exam. The Sexual Assault Advocate also facilitates groups for victims.


Project: SAFE constantly evaluates the measurement tools utilized to track valuable data. In future reports, the agency intends to incorporate more comparative data as well as surveys by both staff, partners and clients. We are striving to be responsive to the needs in our community and intend to utilize qualitative and quantitative data to stay connected to how to best serve Pottawatomie and Lincoln Counties.








Age for Shelter and Non-Shelter Clients - 1,134







While we serve victims of crime, these top 6 victimization types drive our services to victims. The total number of victimization types are calculated based on individual's responses when screening in.



### Direct Services -

The categories below list the types of direct services received by an individual through Project: SAFE. These numbers do not include the number of times the service was provided - only the number of individuals who were provided the service itself. This number does not equal the total number of clients served because clients can receive multiple types of services from our agency.





A total of 492 protective orders were assisted with by an Advocate from Project: SAFE in 2022.






Our Mental Health Professional provides specialized counseling along with education and consultation around domestic violence and sexual assault clients.


